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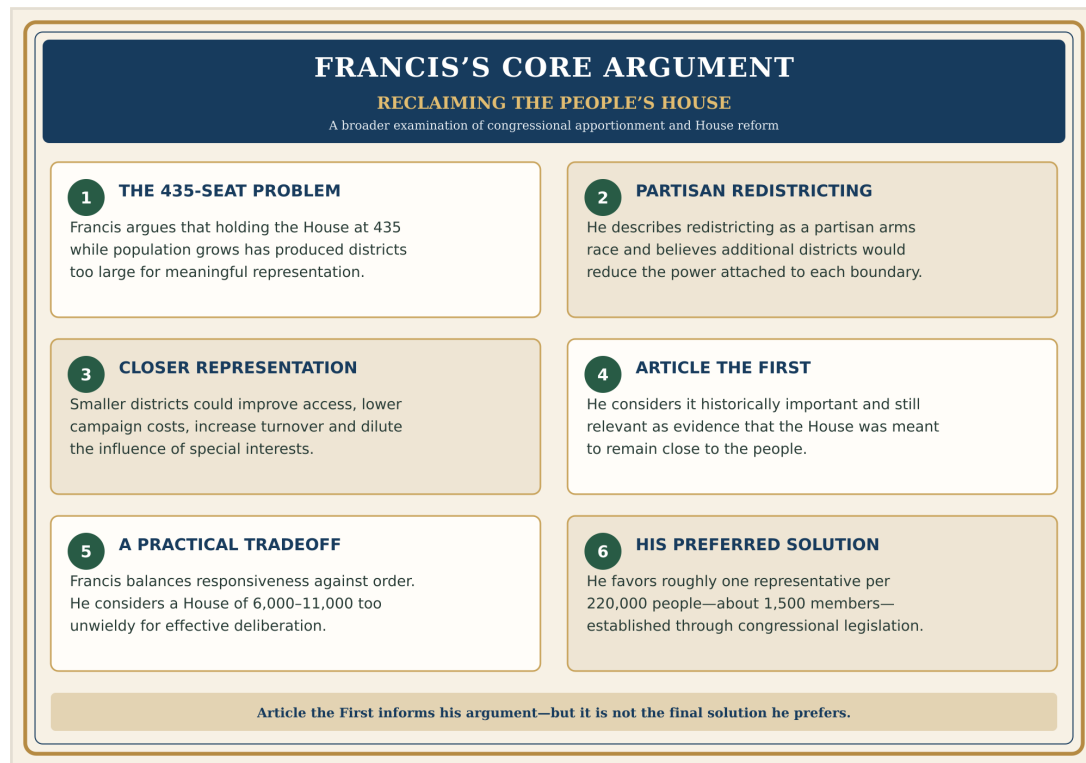
Apportionment: The Original First Amendment on TCTV

Francis's overall position

Francis argues that:

- Congressional apportionment is a neglected but fundamental constitutional subject.
- Keeping the House at 435 while population grows has created districts too large for meaningful representation.
- Partisan redistricting has become an arms race between the major parties.
- Smaller districts would make representatives more accessible, reduce campaign costs, encourage turnover and dilute special-interest influence.
- Article the First demonstrates that the House was originally intended to remain close to the people.
- A House containing 6,000–11,000 representatives would become difficult to manage.
- His preferred balance is approximately one representative per 220,000 people, producing a House of roughly 1,500 members.
- Congress could establish his preferred House size through ordinary legislation.

Francis's Core Argument



Where Francis aligns with ATFI

- Article the First has been largely forgotten.
- Representation was considered fundamental by the founding generation.
- Meaningful representation helps protect the people's other rights.
- The 435-seat House has distanced representatives from their constituents.
- Smaller districts could improve citizen participation.
- Article the First remains historically and constitutionally relevant.
- The original proposal does not contain a ratification deadline.
- Connecticut should not simply be counted as

having ratified Article the First.

- Public education about representation is greatly needed.
- Original language and ratification history deserve further study.

The central difference

Francis uses Article the First primarily as historical evidence supporting a larger and more representative House.

His preferred solution is:

Approximately one representative per 220,000 people, producing a House of roughly 1,500 members through congressional legislation.

ATFI's concentrated objective is:

Education about Article the First followed by state-by-state action to complete its ratification.

Therefore, Article the First supports Francis's broader apportionment argument, but ratification is not the final solution he prefers.

Important verification findings

- Francis repeatedly says an amendment needed ratification by two-thirds of the states. Article V requires three-fourths of the states. Two-thirds is the threshold for Congress to propose an amendment. [National Archives](#)
- He says the House was fixed permanently at 435 in approximately 1912. The 1911 reapportionment

established a 435-member House, but the continuing cap and automatic reapportionment procedure came through the Permanent Apportionment Act of 1929. [House History, Permanent Apportionment Act](#)

- Francis treats Article the First's "nor more than one Representative for every fifty thousand persons" as establishing a maximum district population of 50,000. Grammatically, "nor more than one Representative" appears to limit the number of representatives. That is what produces the mathematical contradiction when combined with the 200-member minimum.
- He calls the "nor more than" wording a likely scrivener's error and suggests that ratification might restart using corrected language. That is a theory, not an established legal determination.
- He states that Delaware recognized the wording flaw and rejected Article the First because of it. That conclusion deserves verification against Delaware's actual legislative record before ATFI repeats it as fact.
- His claim that a Wyoming voter's power may be thirteen times that of a California voter appears to confuse House representation with the much greater disparity produced by equal representation in the Senate.
- Several exact numbers in the automated transcript are garbled. Francis's preferred ratio produces approximately 1,500 representatives, but direct

quotations of his calculations should be checked against the video or book.

Final classification
